Misconceptions About Caregiving Add Stress

aring for a chronically ill or frail senior relative can offer many rewards, but it also involves physical, psychological and emotional demands. It can be particularly challenging when the care receiver has heavy hands-on needs, a diffi-

cult personality or mental impairment.

Stress can be further compounded by certain common misconceptions

thoughts and belief systems. Read on for some Lisa Petsche among caregivers and the

unhealthy behaviors that typically result.



Faulty Thinking

They can and should do all of the caregiving alone.

No one else can take good care of their relative.

Medical professionals are wrong about their relative's diagnosis, prognosis or healthcare needs. (Reasons for misconception: the medical opinion is too painful to consider; or, the caregiver distrusts healthcare professionals because of past negative experiences.)

Maladaptive Behavior

Devoting all of their time and energy to the caregiving role.

Promising the care receiver or the family that they will never place the relative in a long-term-care residence.

Withholding from other family members information about their relative's condition and needs

Healthy Coping

The following are adaptive coping strategies caregivers can use to prevent falling into destructive behavior patterns.

Acceptance

An important first step is to accept the reality of your relative's illness. Allow yourself to experience all of the emotions that surface. Make a conscious decision to let go of any bitterness resulting from unrealized plans and dreams, so you can

move forward and channel your energy in constructive ways.

Accept that how your relative feels and what they can do may fluctuate, and be flexible about plans. Unrealistic expectations will only result in frustration for both of you.

Information


Ask a friend to research your relative's health condition. Share the information among family members. Knowledge is power.

Be open to learning practical skills, such as proper transferring and bathing techniques. Mastering these tasks will help make caregiving safer and less stressful. The local Area Agency on Aging is a good resource for all kinds of care information, including community services that can assist your relative and you.

Communication

Be patient and keep communication

lines open as you and your relative learn to adjust to the illness.

Ensure the family is kept current about changes in your relative's status and include them in decision-making as much as possible.

Preparation

Find a medical specialist whom you and your relative respect and trust. Ask about what to expect during the course of the illness in terms of probable symptom progression as well as caregiving skills, medical equipment and community supports likely to be needed.

Talk openly with your relative about their wishes. Discuss living arrangements, outside help, surrogate decision-making, advance directives and funeral arrangements. Since you don't know what the future holds, be careful not to make promises that you may not be able to keep.

Help your relative get their affairs in order, including completing legal paperwork such as advance directives, powers of attorney and a will.

Simplification

Eliminate as many sources of stress in your life as possible. Set priorities, streamline tasks and learn to settle for less than perfection.

Hire help with personal care or household chores if finances permit.

Take things one day at a time so you don't become overwhelmed.

Self-Preservation

Look after your physical health. Eat nutritious meals, get adequate rest, exercise and see your primary physician regularly.

Set aside quiet time to nurture your spirituality and help to keep you grounded. If applicable, turn to your religious faith for support.

Do something that provides you with meaning and purpose outside of the caregiving role, such as scrapbooking or researching your family tree.

Find something relaxing you can do to give yourself a daily break – perhaps reading or listening to music. In addition, schedule regular breaks from caregiving duties. Take a couple of hours, a day or an overnight. By being kind to yourself this way, you'll also be more effective when you resume your caregiving tasks.

Connection

Make an effort to stay connected to your friends. Find at least one person you can talk to openly – someone who will listen and empathize. It's important to express your thoughts and feelings.

Try talking with other caregivers. They understand better than anyone else what you are going through. Join a support group in your community or on the Internet.

Assistance

Accept offers of help. Ask other family members to share the load and be specific about the type of help you need.

If you don't have family nearby or they're not willing or able to assist, take advantage of respite services in your community.

You can't, and shouldn't, do everything alone.



Just last week a renowned Wildlife Artist, Michael Collins and his wife, Susan, were here in the Valley visiting Connie Rainey and Frank Freshwater. Daughter Emily Griffin met them having lunch at Tapatio's Mexican Restaurant. She interviewed them for the Citizen Georgian in Montezuma and passed the information on to us.

Michael has so many talents it is hard to believe. We may leave out one or two, but we'll do our best! Besides artist, writer, engraver, restorer of murals and conservationist, Mr. Collins is a first-class Wildlife Artist. This is how our friends, the Freshwaters, met him. They all have been active at the Celebrity Shoots which they attend several times a year, even as far away as Hollywood, California! Michael donates pictures or carvings or engravings, and Frank and Connie donate a Safari Trip... all to very good causes like Disability Resources of Texas and Wish Upon a Star. Frank hunted with a 14-year-old Wish Upon a Star terminal patient in Canada who bagged everything he had in mind.


Michael has the distinct ability, not only to paint a likeness, but to make it come alive on canvas. That is why he was invited to visit Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II in April 2012. Long ago in a casual conversation at one of the celebrity shoots in Hollywood, Michael and his friend James Partee were talking with Laport Sporting Goods' Graham Browne, who lived in England and was in the Queen's Special Service. Collins was asked to paint Musket, one of Queen Elizabeth's and Prince Phillip's favorite hunting dogs while Partee was asked to paint Carlton House, a prize racehorse given to the Queen by the ruler of DuBois.

Only 200 prints were to be made of the favored animals, and only to raise money for charity works or given to family and friends. This event turned out to be one of the highest honors

and privileges of Michael's entire life. Lords of London identified the originals and prints as "priceless" because there had never been one before. It was the first time in hunting that private artists had painted any of the family's sporting animals.

Michael cannot praise Queen Elizabeth enough. He says, "She was so kind and welcoming. She made you feel like you were talking to your grandmother. It was a wonderful visit with a wonderful person."

To their surprise, Michael and James were asked to worship with the Royal Couple at Saint Mary Magdalene Church and then to join the Queen for the presentation of the paintings at her private residence. They were so honored, especially after they were told that this was the first time the Queen had received anyone informally in her private home other than family and close friends.

As afore mentioned, Michael has the unique ability to make a

painting or engraving live his personal vision. Being a first-class engraver has not gone unnoticed. He designed many years for Browning and is now designing Fox Knives of Italy. Many people have their rifles and pistols engraved for distinction. No matter how small the engraving, Michael can do it. He is said to have 20/20 to 20/30 eyesight. It is said, you can see the smallest bird feather in his work.

This true Renaissance Man and Southern Gentleman of South Carolina and die-hard conservationist has donated many works to Ducks Unlimited, Quails Unlimited and the Turkey Federation.

You have probably seen his famous restorations of Menaboni's Peacock in the Swanson House in Atlanta and murals in the R. J. Reynolds Museum on Sapelo Island, Georgia. When you are out and about, check out his very first individual exhibit at the Chattahoochee Nature Center between Marietta and Roswell, Georgia... still a very happy place serving injured and orphaned wild animals and birds.

New Veterans Benefit at Andersonville National Cemetery

Reimbursement for grave liners now offered to eligible veterans

ndersonville National
Historic Site is pleased to announce a
new benefit offered to eligible veterans.

Veterans who wish to be buried in Andersonville National Cemetery will now receive the same grave liner reimbursement benefit as veterans buried in other national cemeteries.

This new benefit is available to those buried in Andersonville National Cemetery on or after June 15, 2018. It provides a reimbursement, at the same rate provided by the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA), for the staterequired grave liner. It also provides reimbursement of up to \$500 for installation of the liner.

We are very pleased to be able to provide this benefit to veterans buried in Andersonville National Cemetery, said Superintendent Gia Wagner. They have more than earned these benefits through their service to our country. We are grateful to the Friends of Andersonville for their work in getting legislation passed that now allows us to provide the same benefits as other national cemeteries. We are committed to offering burial services and honors to veterans and their families, and we are pleased to expand the benefits we provide to them.

Previously, veterans who wished to be buried in Andersonville National Cemetery had to purchase the grave liner and were financially responsible for any fees associated with the liner installation. In most other national cemeteries, both the grave liner

and installation are provided at no cost to the veteran. This gap in benefits was due to a gap in legislation.

Most national cemeteries are managed by the National Cemetery Administration (NCA), part of the VA. However, Andersonville National Cemetery is managed by the National Park Service (NPS), within the Department of Interior (Department). Congress had previously authorized the VA to provide this benefit, but this authorization did not extend to the Department.

With advocacy and support from the Friends of Andersonville, Congress corrected the gap in veterans benefits in

June 2018 through the Veterans
Cemetery Benefits Correction Act. The
act authorizes the Department and the
NPS to provide the same grave liner
benefit provided by the VA and NCA.
Once the legislation passed, the NPS
worked to create procedures and mechanisms to implement the new legislation.
These procedures are now in place and
this benefit can now be provided.

BBB Tip: What to Know Before Donating to a Crowdfunding Cause

rowdfunding campaigns are helping to raise money for a multitude of causes, from little league teams to medical bills.

Crowdfunding can make supporting – and raising money for – a good cause easier than ever, but it's not without issues. Con artists can use crowdfunding platforms to deceive donors and steal money for personal use. Or the money can be raised with the best intentions, but not

end up used for its stated

purpose.

Potential crowdfunding donors should proceed with caution and do research before making a donation to any individual or cause. The following tips will help you practice smart giving if you decide to donate on a crowdfunding platform.

Give to individuals and organizations you know personally. Charities can be vetted, but it is much harder to verify the trust-worthiness of individuals who have posted a request for financial help. The safest way to donate on a crowdfunding platform is to give to someone you already know.

Photos don't mean a campaign is legitimate. Con artists often use pictures of victims without their permission to make donors believe the campaign is legitimate. This is especially true in the wake of a major tragedy.

Not all crowdfunding sites have the same rules. Some platforms do a better job of reviewing projects and postings than others.

Make sure you read up on the website's rules, regulations, and procedures. For example, on one site, if a post claims to support the victims of a recent tragedy, the site holds any funds collected for victims and distributes them directly to the identified persons or families. On other sites, donors must rely on the creator of the

post to follow through on any assistance they promise to give.

Transparency is key. Vague descriptions of how donated funds will be used is a big red flag. Trustworthy charities and individuals will clearly explain the intended use of collected funds.

Avoid duplicate efforts. Stay up to date on the latest news about victim support efforts. If government agencies offer to pay for

images.

healthcare or funeral costs, for example, any crowdfunding pages that offer the same assistance may have to ask donors if their funds can be used in an alternative way.

Beware of emotional appeals and images. Scammers love to con people out of money by telling overly dramatic tales that elicit an emotional response. They usually pair their appeals with urgent pleas, saying they need the money right now. In addition, they may support their stories with heart wrenching

Protect your personal information. Before you make an online donation, make sure the charity's website is secure (the web address should begin with https://) and that a privacy policy is in place regarding the use of your name, email and other personal data.

Not all donations are tax deductible. In general, donations made to help a specifically identified individual or family are not deductible as a charity donation for federal income tax purposes. Also, if a nonprofit organization is soliciting for donations, see if it is tax exempt as a charity under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

Read the fine print.
Besides the privacy policy, a website's fine print will tell you under what conditions (if at all) donations will be refunded and how the site handles credit card and administrative fees.

Consider donating on specialized crowdfunding

websites. When crowdfunding sites are dedicated to a specific kind of giving, such as medical funding or school projects, they are more likely to have experience spotting problems or scams. General crowdfunding sites may experience more challenges overseeing user activity.

Dublin VA nurse receives national DAISY Award

he Carl Vinson VA Medical Center in Dublin, Ga., on behalf of the national DAISY Award Foundation, recently announced the selection of RN Lynn M. Rountree as a recipient of the prestigious DAISY Award for Extraordinary Nurses.

The DAISY Award memorializes J. Patrick Barnes who died from the complications of the autoimmune disease idiopathic thrombocytopenic purpura in 1999 at the age of 33. The DAISY Award, which stands for Diseases Attacking the Immune SYstem, and the DAISY Foundation, were developed by Barnes family as a way to acknowledge superior commitment to nursing by registered nurses, which they experienced during Patrick s final illness and attribute to helping them bear their loss.

The award recognizes the compassion and professionalism of nurses for the extraordinarily skillful and compassionate care they provide patients and families. Nurses are nominated nationally on the foundation s web site or by mail and the nominations forwarded to local review committees for consideration. Nominees are rated based on explicit criteria including whether they serve as role models for the nursing profession, demonstrate caring attitudes, communicate compassionately, and if they have a significant impact on the lives of patients and families. In addition to a plaque, lapel pin, and monetary award, selectees receive many gifts, including fresh cinnamon rolls which were the only food that Patrick Barnes could tolerate in the final days of his life.

Rountree was nominated for the award by Dr. Andrea Lambert, a primary care physician at the Dublin VA who recognized Rountree s superior professionalism in her work caring for a veteran who was reluctant to receive the COVID-19 vaccination. Despite the veteran s fears, Rountree continued to maintain contact with the veteran and coordinate his care.

RN Rountree is a very inspiring and loving person who takes the time to genuinely care for her patients. Watching her nursing practice reminds me of Leo Buscalgia s observation that too often we underestimate the power of a touch, a smile, a kind word, a listening ear, an honest accomplishment, or the smallest act of caring, all of which have the potential to turn a life around. Lynn is the embodiment of that sentiment in her daily actions and a true inspiration for all us at the VA, Lambert said.

A nurse since 2003, Rountree has worked at the Dublin VA for seven years and was an LPN for three years before receiving her nursing credential. A member of the Green Team in Primary Care where she primarily assists

Drs. Andrea Lambert and Mathew Mathai, both of whom she credits along with her other teammates of creating an environment of support and professionalism that allow her to excel as a nurse.

We can t practice medicine alone. It takes a dedicated team and I am grateful to have one, Rountree said.

Rountree noted that being a nurse was always the plan.

I have always wanted to be a nurse. I realized at a young age that nurses are the real care givers that go that extra step to help the patient and family members navigate and cope and understand their health issues. I worked many years in the Critical Care Unit and it really hit home that we nurses are the interpreters and advocates for the patients. We hold the hand of sick and dying patients and family members and we celebrate their recovery.†Nurses have a special bond to their patients. They trust us. Many times, veterans will come to the nurses for assistance and they really appreciate the efforts made by the nursing staff. That s a sacred trust that all good nurses take very seriously.

Reflecting on receiving the DAISY Award, Rountree was appreciative but observed that the work itself is inherently rewarding.

I was very honored to receive the Daisy Award. I am just doing my duty to serve our veterans to the best of my ability. Nursing is so rewarding. That is what nursing is all about helping others. It feels good and I hope that fire never goes out, she said.

Dr. Pam Jackson, head nurse at the Dublin VA, emphasized the model of nursing and VA professionalism that Rountree epitomizes.

It was an honor recognizing Ms. Rountree as our DAISY recipient. This esteemed nationally recognized award recognizes nurses who go above and beyond to call of duty

when delivering care. Ms. Rountree s commitment to veteran care shows in everything that she does for our veterans in Primary Care. It s not only the impeccable clinical skills of the nurse that make the difference in the lives of our veteran, but the care and compassion in which the skill is delivered that Lynn demonstrates. We salute her and congratulate her on receiving this honor and being such an extraordinary example for others to follow, Jackson said.

VA medical center director David Whitmer affirmed Jackson s sentiments.

Everyone at the VA is crucial for our success in caring for America s heroes, but when you look at healthcare from a high-level, it s almost always a nurse who makes the difference in a patient s perception of quality care. I have many nurses in my own family, so I certainly have a soft spot for nurses and admire them and what they do. RN Rountree s commitment to nursing excellence makes our entire VA team look good and honors nurses everywhere, Whitmer said.



Dublin Rotary Club and MAP International delivering critical Medicine to J.O.Y. Medical Clinic

he Rotary Club of Dublin and MAP International are teaming up to deliver life-saving medicine at no cost to the J.O.Y. Medical Clinic in Dublin.

Established in June 2012, J.O.Y. Medical Clinic is a volunteer-based nonprofit Christian health clinic that provides medical, dental and eye care services to those who live in Laurens County, are employed and without health insurance or to those who have been unemployed for 6 months or less and are actively seeking employment. Patients' total household income must meet 200% or less of the Federal Poverty Level. The medical and administrative office is located at 410 Academy Avenue in Dublin.

Saving Lives with Medicine is an initiative of Georgia Rotary Clubs and MAP International that supports free and charitable Georgia clinics with critical medicines and health supplies to uninsured patients. With the addition of the Dublin clinic, Rotary and MAP International are sending medicine to seven free and charitable clinics in Georgia reaching more than 4,200 patients.

"This partnership delivers medicines and supplies that improve the health of Georgians who struggle to treat their chronic diseases," said Rotary Club President Will Curry. He said the partnership focuses on medications for hypertension, diabetes, high cholesterol and asthma. Rotary pays for packaging, shipping and handling of the deliveries while MAP International works with pharmaceutical companies to collect, store and distribute medicines.

"Since the statewide project started in 2017, patient health conditions have

improved significantly", Curry said. Clinics participating in Saving Lives with Medicine reported chronic disease conditions of patients have improved by 50% for patients with hypertension, 61% for patients with diabetes, 63% for patients with high cholesterol, and 82% for asthma patients.

"More than 150 million Americans suffer from at least one chronic disease and almost 30 million Americans are living with five or more chronic diseases," said Rita Green, RN, Clinic Director of the J.O.Y. Medical Clinic. "Chronic diseases such as high blood pressure, diabetes and chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD). More than two thirds of all deaths are caused by chronic diseases – in fact, chronic disease is the leading cause of death in the U.S. We are so very excited to have the Dublin Rotary Club and MAP International as our partners at the J.O.Y. Medical Clinic! As a non-profit medical clinic, this partnership will support our efforts in providing life changing medications and supplies to our patients who live with chronic disease. These medications will improve our patient's health, help control the disease, prevent complications, ER visits and hospitalizations. Mediations like insulin and inhalers cost several hundred dollars for just one vial or one inhaler and that's only enough medicine to last about a month or even less. As you can see, the cost alone would prevent those without insurance from obtaining the live saving medications they need. Dr. Bob Shuman, the clinic's Medical Director and the clinic staff

BBB Tip: Planning your next family vacation or trip!

hen planning an event, looking for a good deal for a family vacation, or a getaway, BBB encourages people to plan ahead to save money, avoid scams, and travel safely.

Scammers will often target people looking for great deals online by offering tempting vacation packages at unrealistically low prices. One place to begin an online search is BBB.org for finding reputable travel agencies,

BBB adds the following tips to help ensure an enjoyable vacation:

agents and websites.

Plan ahead. Allow plenty of time to research hotels, flights, and the area where you will be staying. Typically, the earlier reservations are made, the better the deals and the lower the risk of the destination being booked solid. Making reservations in advance also locks in rates and prevents higher prices later during prime spring break, peak summer, or holiday travel seasons.

Avoid broad internet searches. Entering phrases like 'best deals' into whichever search engine used can sometimes bring up-websites that look official but are designed solely to rip people off.

Be alert for travel scams. Watch out for phone calls or letters claiming a 'free trip' or websites offering prices that appear too good to be true. It's easy to extend questionable offers like these, but the vast majority of them leave

hopeful travelers in limbo – and out money.

Do your homework. Ask family and friends to recommend a travel agent or travel website and visit BBB.org for free Business Profiles. Research the business and read customer reviews about any rentals under consideration.

Get trip details in writing.

Before making a final payment, get all the details of the trip in writing. This should include the total cost, restrictions, cancellation penalties, and names of the airlines and hotels. Also, review and keep a copy of the airline and hotel's cancellation and refund policies, as well as the cancellation policies of the travel agency or booking site used.

Consider travel insurance.

Travel insurance covers things like trip cancellations or medical emergencies. There are different levels of coverage based on what type of plan purchased. Ask a lot of questions, and always read the fine print to see continued on page 18

what's covered and what's not.

Pay with a credit card. Paying with a credit card provides additional protection if something should go wrong with the travel reservation.

No matter when or where you are traveling, take extra precautions:

Wait to post on social media. It's fun to post adventures with friends and family but wait until getting back from the trip. Photos and social media posts of the family having a great time also lets thieves know the house is empty.

Check your home insurance. If your home will be unattended while away, make sure you know your responsibilities under your home insurance policy. Some policies do not cover damage if nobody checks on your home for a certain amount of time.

Share a copy of the itinerary with a family member or close friend. Include the contact information of someone joining you on your trip.

Take a map. People rely heavily on smartphones and GPS. Consider having an atlas or hard copy map just in case of technical difficulties.

Check the weather conditions where you will be traveling and pack appropriate supplies and clothing.

Avoid traveling alone. Use the buddy system and stick with the group.

Use a hotel safe to store extra cash and keep any valuables under lock and key.
