senior relative, however, may be so preoccupied that they find it hard to reap the benefits of the season.

If you are a caregiver, read on for a variety of ideas for streamlining necessary tasks in order to ensure some time for leisure this summer. Ideas for activities to enjoy with your relative are also included.

General Tips

- · Establish and stick to priorities, and curb perfectionism. Not everything needs to be done to a high standard. Set a time limit for chores if necessary/
- · Be flexible about plans and expectations, taking into account your relative's energy level and

yours at any given time, as well as the weather. Take things one day at a

- · Pay for a grounds keeping service if you can afford it.
- · If you do not have central air conditioning, get a window air conditioner or oscillating fan for the room(s) you use the most. Before a heat wave hits, check that any such appliances are in good repair.

Meal Preparation

- Collect recipes for one-dish meals, such as main course salads.
- Cook double batches of recipes and freeze half for later use.
- · Keep a supply of heat-and-serve entrees in the freezer.
- · Buy convenience foods that reduce preparation time: packaged salads, shredded cheese and boneless chicken breasts, for example.
- Order takeout now and then, as finances permit.
- Get a box of favorite ice cream treats the next time you are at the grocery store. Or, if feasible, take your relative out to the local dairy bar for an ice cream cone or sundae.

Shopping and Errands

 Run errands and schedule appointments early in the day, before temperatures peak.

- · Shop by mail order whenever
- · Take advantage of stores and other services that offer home deliv-
- Research mobile services in your area, such as hairdressing and foot care for your relative, and dog grooming, especially if transportation is an issue.

Ideas for Activities

The following are some ideas for enjoying quality time together.

- Have morning coffee or evening tea on the balcony, deck or patio, as applicable.
- Cook favorite foods on the grill.
- · Watch a favorite summer-themed
- · Have a picnic in your backyard or at a nearby park.
- Go for a stroll around the neighborhood, using a wheelchair if nec-
- Take your relative to the local farmers market for fresh fruits and vegetables, as well as favorite meats, cheeses and baked goods.
- Go to an accessible park or other outdoor public space and peoplewatch.
- · Attend some or your children's or grandchildren's baseball or soccer

games. Just be sure your relative can safely navigate the distance and terrain from paring lot to sports field. And do not forget a chair for them that offers good support.

- Attend an outdoor concert or summer art festival.
 - Go for a drive in the country.
- If it is hard to get out, obtain some CDs featuring summertime sounds of nature (babbling brooks, loons calling, and son on), and play them in the background while eating meals or reading the newspaper, for example.
- Reminisce about summers from your youth, including family customs, special people and places and touching or humorous moments.

Do not forget to set aside some personal time, for self-care. Make a habit of doing something you enjoy every day: read, listen to music or spend time in the garden, for example, even if fifteen or twenty minutes are all you can manage. Consider this a necessary time to recharge your batteries.

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
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"United We Stand" Flag Day 2016... Snellville, Georgia

work involved a lot more than just digging in the dirt and reading the Bible.

"Our ten years serving as missionaries taught us that living incarnationally means becoming involved in the issues facing those that we serve – water and sanitation, agriculture, health, education, and many social issues. People are more open to receiving the Gospel from those of us who recognize the many issues of their daily life and help with their solutions," Ed said.

"To really know another culture, you need to attend a wedding and a funeral, share a meal with a family and sit with a grieving mother," Linda said. "Every eight seconds somewhere on the world a child dies of a water related disease. It is so sad that the parents have no idea why."

In 2011, the Bakers were called back home to work in more of an administrative role which includes serving as sanitation specialists for the Global Resource Team and as speakers for churches, civic groups and public schools. After years of being active members of Cannon United Methodist Church in Snellville, the couple recently sold their Lawrenceville home and moved to Lake Oconee where they are enjoying life near clean abundant water!

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Task Force Patriot celebrate special June Dinner Meeting

he Task Force Patriot June dinner meeting proved significant for the guest speaker, Ron Mastin, Lieutenant Colonel, U.S. Air Force (Ret.) and guest Debra Poirot, Office Manager for U.S. Congressman Rob Woodall. The two were introduced by Task Force Patriot Founder Jim Freeman, Major, U.S. Army (Ret.) for the very first time.

In 1966, Lieutenant Mastin began flying combat missions into North Vietnam with the 11th Tactical Reconnaissance Squadron out of Udorn, Royal Thai AFB, Thailand. While on his 34th combat mission on


January 16th, 1967 he was forced to eject from his aircraft over North Vietnam. He was captured and held by Vietnamese farmers who turned him over to the North Vietnamese military, where he became a prisoner of war for the next 2,239 days.

Debra Poirot was growing up during this same time as a U.S. Air Force "Brat," living on various military facilities around the world, one of which was Clark AFB in the Philippines. Being the daughter of an Air Force C-141 aircraft navigator gave her a passion for those who were being captured and held as Prisoners of War. Debra selected the name of Captain Ron Mastin to begin wearing his POW bracelet until such time as he would be released or declared dead. She wore the bracelet for over ten years, never once meeting Ron Mastin. He was released from enemy captivity during Operation

Homecoming on March 4,

On Thursday evening
June 2, 2016 Debra presented
the bracelet bearing the name
of Captain Mastin to now,
Lieutenant Colonel Mastin,
nearly 50 years after making
her commitment to wear it on
behalf of the captured officer.
LTC Mastin was recognized
for his distinguished military
service and Debra Poirot was
commended for her persevering support of an American
Prisoner of War. An emotional
meeting to say the least.

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
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
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Hang up on Robocalls-

If you have a telephone, robocalls may be ruining your day. If you answer the phone and hear a recorded message instead of a live person, it's a robocall. If the recording is a sales message and you haven't given your written permission to receive calls from the company on the other end, the call is illegal.

Since most of us frequently receive robocalls, we know that being illegal doesn't mean that the calls aren't happening. Technology has made it cheap and easy for scammers to make illegal calls from anywhere in the world, and to hide from law enforcement by displaying fake caller ID information. The Federal Trade Commission reports it has brought more than a hundred lawsuits against over 600 companies and individuals responsible for billions of illegal robocalls and other Do Not Call violations.

In fact, earlier this month, the FTC brought suit against a company that they say is responsible for hundreds of thousands of these calls. According to the FTC, Life Management Services swindled people out of their money by offering two types of phony debt relief: credit card interest rate reduction services and credit card debt elimination services. The company promised lower interest rates or government funds to pay off debt, and asked people to make initial payments ranging from \$500 to \$20,000. But almost no one got the help that was promised.

Not all robocalls are illegal so which types are allowed?

Recorded messages regarding candidates running for office or charities asking for donations are allowed. Messages that are solely informational, for example a reminder from your pharmacy or doctor's office or a message from a business that is contacting you to collect a debt, are permitted. Prerecorded messages from banks, telephone carriers and charities also are exempt from these rules if the banks, carriers or charities make the calls themselves.

How do I know if a robocall is illegal?

An immediate red flag is if the recording is trying to promote the sale of a good or service. If the recording is a sales message and you haven't given your written permission to get calls from the company on the other end, the call is illegal. Beware of robocalls that are blatantly illegal because the pitch is mostly likely a scam. In addition, if you are listed on the national Do Not Call Registry and you still receive a recorded sales message, you can be sure the company is breaking the law and trying to scam you.

A telemarketer must have your written consent, whether through paper or electronic means, to receive a call or message. The company is not allowed to justify the call based solely on an 'established business relationship' with you. Simply buying a product, or contacting a business with a question, no longer gives them legal permission to call you. The rules also require telemarketers to allow you to opt out of receiving additional telemarketing robocalls immediately during a prerecorded telemarketing call through an automated menu. There are harsh penalties for sellers and telemarketers who break the rules and transmit prerecorded messages to consumers who have not agreed in writing to accept such messages. They can face penalties of up to \$16,000 per call.

Before responding to unsolicited phone calls, the BBB advises:

- Never give out any financial information. If you did not initiate the call, do not provide bank account, credit card or social security numbers over the phone to unknown callers.
- Don't rely on caller ID. Scammers can use technology to make it appear as though their calls are coming from legitimate businesses or organizations.
 Some will even display as your own telephone number.
- Hang up the phone. Don't press 1 to speak to a live operator and don't press any other number to get your number off the list. If you respond by pressing any number, it will probably just lead to more robocalls.
- Consider contacting your phone provider. Ask your provider to block the number, and whether they charge for that service. Remember that telemarketers change Caller ID information easily and often, so it might not be worth paying a fee to block a number that will change.
- Trust your instincts. If something doesn't seem right to you, end the call.

· All Summer Long: Dorothea Benton Frank, William Morrow, 2016

A Il Summer Long by Dorothea Benton Frank is a good read and would also be a good movie. Not that it's particularly profound. Despite mixed reviews, it's solid writing with an interesting set of dilemmas and characters. Frank, who has written sixteen Low country novels, is known for her "smart and witty fiction" and "edgy stories." In her newest release, she addresses the challenges facing an enticing New York couple who decide to simply their lives through downsizing and relocation. Sound familiar? That's because so many of our nation's retirees are doing the same, particularly in our metro area.

The story revolves around successful interior designer Olivia

Ritchie and her college professor husband Nicholas Seymour. Very much in love despite their differences, the two have built a happy committed marriage. But, as with many older couples, one is set on "going home" while the other has doubts. The issue is particularly difficult because Olivia is very much a northerner and New Yorker and her husband longs for the peaceful slow pace of his Lowcountry south. They find a house they think they can afford on Sullivan's Island near Charleston, South Carolina. It seems like a dream come true until Olivia factors in needed repairs that may be expensive.

As the time for their move draws near, Nicholas is consumed by happiness as Olivia experiences the opposite. She is as unprepared to deal with their new lifestyle as, she discovers, are their finances. With large renovation expenditures looming, she has second thoughts. Increasingly, she comes to rely on her assistant Roni Larini for help and moral

support.

In the middle of their decision-making, Olivia and Nicholas embark on a summer journey

with her billionaire clients and their friends. Exploring the world with the ultrarich is exciting but comes with pitfalls, as well as unusual and eccentric characters. All Summer Long tells "a story of how plans evolve and lives change in unexpected ways, how even those who have everything are still looking for something more." Dorothea Benton Frank was born and raised on Sullivan's Island and now lives in the New York area with husband.
