The 2017 National Senior Games will be held in Birmingham, AL, June 2-15, 2017. To qualify for the National Games, an athlete must place 1st-4th (for most events at a State qualifying event. Some sports are "limited events" which means an athlete can qualify in ways other than a state qual-

The 2017 National Senior Games presented by Humana will be held on the 30th Anniversary of The Games, and planning is well underway to celebrate this landmark. 




