## Macon-Bibb County Health Department awarded Car Seat Mini Grant

Buckle Up Right, Every Trip, Every Time

The Macon-Bibb County
Health Department was awarded the
2016 Car Seat Mini-Grant by the
Georgia Department of Public
Health, Injury Prevention Program.
Through the Mini-Grant, we are able
to provide car seats and education to
financially eligible families in
Macon-Bibb County. This program
is funded by the Governor's Office
of Highway Safety to help ensure
Georgia's children are safe while riding in motor vehicles.

And it works! Since 2007, the education, car seats and booster seats provided through the Mini Grant prevented serious injury or death and saved at least 303 of Georgia's children who were involved in crashes. According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, car seats reduce fatal injuries by 71 percent among infants and by 54 percent among children ages 1 to 4 years in passenger cars. Car seats offer the best protection for children in the event of a crash, and they are most effective when installed and used correctly. Nearly three out of

every four car seats are not used properly, placing children at unnecessary risk.

"It's our responsibility to keep our children safe," said Stephanie Hyman, SafeKids Coordinator at Macon-Bibb County Health Department. "The Car Seat Mini-Grant is a great opportunity to help our community and help protect our kids from serious injuries or death in motor vehicle crashes."

In Macon-Bibb County, the local Health Department educates parents and caregivers on how to properly install and use car seats, offers car seat inspections and provides car seats and booster seats to financially eligible families. Through the Car Seat Mini-Grant, agencies supporting more than 130 counties are working to keep Georgia's children safe. These programs help families get their children buckled up right, every trip, every time.



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
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## Alzheimer's advocates raise voices for local legislative change

More than 130,000 Georgia residents are living with Alzheimer's disease or other dementias with the total predicted to increase to 190,000 by 2025. Georgia Chapter will have more than 300 advocates from across the state meet with leaders at the Georgia State Capitol to encourage three key policy changes for 2016:

Update Georgia's Power of Attorney Act to provide a simple way for people to deal with property issues by providing a power of attorney, in case of future incapacity, while at the same time including safeguards to protect the incapacitated individual from financial abuse.

Update Georgia's Adult Guardianship Statutes to make it consistent with the Uniform Adult Guardianship and Protective Proceedings Act (UAGPPA), which establishes a uniform set of rules and framework for state court judges to communicate in multi-jurisdictional cases. This saves time and money for

the guardian by removing jurisdictional barriers. Georgia is one of nine states whose statutes are not consistent with the UGAPPA.

Require mandatory reporting of suspected neglect or abuse of any person by anyone 18 years or older to an adult protection agency or any law enforcement agency. This would help protect adults who cannot physically or mentally protect themselves against abusers responsible for their

Along with policy reform, advocates will meet with policymakers to request more than \$125,000 for the Georgia Bureau of Investigation to fund a forensic auditor and forensic analyst to specifically work on cases of elder abuse. In addition, the local Alzheimer's chapter, as a part of the Coalition of Aging Advocates, is

requesting \$10 million in support for home and community based aging services, which, on average, helps seniors remain in their homes for 50 months before going to a nursing

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
